NATIONAL MARCH FOR LIFE JANUARY 19, 2024

Even with the wonderful blessing of Roe v. Wade being overturned, thus allowing more freedom at the state level to enact pro-life laws, the necessary work to build a culture of life in America is not finished. Rather, the focus is different. Sadly, the number of abortions annually is still well over 900,000 each year. Many national legislative battles loom, including even keeping longstanding Hyde protections, which limit government funding for abortion on annual appropriation bills. The march will continue every January at the national level until a culture of life is restored in the United States of America.

The related events will be held on Friday, January 19, 2024, in Washington, DC. At 12 ET, noon at the National Mall, the March for Life Rally will be held. This FREE event features a live concert and inspiring speeches from pro-life leaders — sharing how to stay involved in the pro-life movement all year long. The event will be live-streamed on www.marchforlife.org and also on their Facebook,

and YouTube channel. The actual March will begin immediately following the rally – usually beginning around 1 p.m. – starting between 12th and 14th Streets. It will proceed peacefully up Constitution Ave. to the steps of the U.S. Capitol Building. Afterwards, participants can consider attending the Silent No More testimonies outside the U.S. Supreme Court or visiting their representative to advocate for life.

St. Agnes of Rome

Feast Day: January 21 Patron saint of girls, chastity, virgins, victims of sex abuse, and gardeners. Her feast day is 21 January.

According to tradition, Agnes was a member of the Roman nobility, born in AD291 and raised in an early Christian family. She suffered martyrdom at the age of twelve or thirteen during the reign of the Roman emperor Diocletian, on 21 January 304. A beautiful young girl from a wealthy




family, Agnes had many suitors of high rank. The young men, slighted by her resolute devotion to religious purity, submitted her name to the pagan authorities as a follower of Christianity.

The Prefect Sempronius condemned Agnes to be dragged naked through the streets to a brothel. In one account, as she prayed, her hair grew and covered her body. It was also said that all of the men who attempted to rape her were immediately struck blind. The son of the Prefect was struck dead but revived after she prayed for him, causing her release. There commenced a trial from which Sempronius recused himself, allowing another figure to preside and sentence St. Agnes to death. She was led out and bound to a stake, but the bundle of wood would not burn, or the flames parted away from her, whereupon the officer in charge of the troops drew his sword and beheaded her, or, in some other texts, stabbed her in the throat. It is also said that her blood poured to the stadium floor where other Christians soaked it up with cloths.

A few days later, her foster-sister, Emerentiana, was found praying by her tomb; she claimed to be the daughter of Agnes' wet nurse, and was stoned to death after refusing to leave the place and reprimanding the people for killing her foster-sister. Emerentiana was also later canonized. The daughter of Constantine I, Constantina, was said to have been cured of leprosy after praying at Agnes' tomb.

Veneration: Agnes was venerated as a saint at least as early as the time of St Ambrose, based on an existing homily. She is commemorated in the Depositio Martyrum of Filocalus (AD354) and in the early Roman Sacramentaries.

Saint Agnes' bones are conserved beneath the high altar in the church of Sant'Agnese fuori le mura in Rome, built over the




catacomb that housed her tomb. Her skull is preserved in a separate chapel in the church of Sant'Agnese in Agone in Rome's Piazza Navona.

Patronage: Because of the legend around her martyrdom, Saint Agnes is patron saint of those seeking chastity and purity. She is also the patron saint of young girls and girl scouts. Folk custom called for them to practice rituals on Saint Agnes' Eve (20–21 January) with a view to discovering their future husbands. This superstition has been immortalized in John Keats's poem, The Eve of Saint Agnes.

Iconography: Since the Middle Ages, Saint Agnes has traditionally been depicted as a young girl with her long hair down, with a lamb, the symbol of both her virginal innocence and her name, and a sword (together with the palm branch an attribute of her martyrdom). The lamb, which is agnus in the Latin language, is also the linguistic link to the traditional blessing of lambs referred to below.

Blessing of the lambs: On the feast of Saint Agnes two lambs are traditionally brought from the Trappist Abbey of Tre Fontane in Rome in order to be blessed by the pope. In summer the lambs are shorn, and the wool is used to weave the pallia which the pope gives on the feast of Saint Peter and Paul to the newly appointed metropolitan archbishops as a sign of his jurisdiction and their union with the pope. This tradition of the blessing of the lambs has been known since the 16th century.

WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY - 2024

This year's theme comes through the combined efforts of the Pontifical Dicastery for Promoting Christian Unity, the World Council of Churches and the Christian churches of Burkina Faso. Much of the coordination of this ecumenical project was done by the community of *Chemin Neuf*, a French Catholic and ecumenical community of vowed and lay people, particularly through their local community in Burkina Faso, a country in the Sahel region of West Africa.

Luke 10:25-37 tells the story of how Jesus is asked by a lawyer, "What must I do to inherit everlasting life?" and Jesus responds, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" The lawyer responds, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." Then Jesus says to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live." But then in order to justify himself, the lawyer says, "And who is my neighbor?" which leads Jesus to tell the parable of the Good Samaritan.

It is a theme rich in charity, mercy, justice and unity. We hope it will facilitate powerful ecumenical prayer and homilies in the 2024 commemoration of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.
