2025 Stewardship at Our Lady

February is our traditional time of revisiting our commitment in service of Church of Our Lady.

In the past few years we have conducted Stewardship Fairs to promote fellowship and make information available to you about

the various ministries and activities which keep our church active, vibrant and which attract new families and members.

We are more committed now than ever in 2025 in promoting Our Lady! We are doing all we can to maintain our building and grounds, provide security and make seamless the changes that have occurred. Fr. Leo is in support of our efforts and encourages us regularly in this respect. We are so thankful that our weekly Mass schedule has been maintained with virtually no interruptions!

This year we find our need is growing more evident. Our weekly collection is on track to fall about \$90K short of meeting basic operating costs for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025! We are falling short in the weekly collection by about \$2,100. If each family were to increase their weekly donation by \$10.00 we could meet this shortfall!

At the Stewardship Event on February 8 & 9, the pledge cards will be handed out as previously. We are asking you to prayerfully consider your commitment this year as every donation is vital!

Your time and talent are so needed! We have openings in the activities related to our liturgical life (Mass, Adoration, Stations of the Cross) that you can fill! In these areas the time commitment is rather small but the effect and importance for you and for the parish cannot

be overestimated!

To illustrate the point, on page 11 of this issue is a notice from the Knights about their Lenten Fish Fry situation; it is in danger of being cancelled! Why? - for lack of workers and lack of families who come to enjoy the meals!

Church of Our Lady cannot survive if we are lukewarm! God put each of us here in this place at this time for a particular reason! *Revelation 3:14-22*

"To the angel of the church in Laodicea, write this: "The Amen, the faithful and true witness, the source of God's creation, says this: "I know your works, I know that you are neither cold nor hot. So, because you are lukewarm, neither hot nor cold, I will spit you out of my mouth. For you say 'I am rich and affluent and have no need of anything, and yet do not realize that you are wretched, pitiable, poor, blind, and naked. I advise you to buy from me gold refined by fire so that you may be rich, and white garments to put on so that your shameful nakedness may not be exposed, and buy ointment to smear on your eyes so that you may see. Those whom I love, I reprove and chastise. Be earnest, therefore, and repent. "'"Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, [then] I will enter his house and dine with him, and he with me....."""Whoever has ears ought to hear what the Spirit says to the churches."""

2024 IRS STATEMENTS


In preparation for printing the 2024 stewardship statements, I found an oversight from the counting process for the week of August 25 - 29, 2024.

From the copies of these loose checks I record your donations into the computer; the check copies are shredded after the data entry! Somehow the copies of the loose checks were not made for this timeframe.

I need your help! I am asking you to review your IRS statement and if you made a loose check donation this past August between 25th and 29th, that you would advise me of the check number and the amount so that I can enter it into your account and print a corrected statement.

The 2024 statements will be available for you to pick up on the weekend of February 8 & 9.

BLESSING OF CANDLES

Sunday, February 2nd The Presentation of the Lord / Candlemas At the 10:00^{am} Mass on Sunday, February 2nd there will be a blessing of candles. You are invited to bring your home candles to this Mass to be blessed, so that you will have this sacramental available to you.

How to use blessed candles

The feast of the Presentation of the Lord is celebrated on February 2. For centuries, it has been a tradition to distribute blessed candles on this feast day. Maybe you have received a candle from this celebration or even from another source. How should you use it?

First of all, the blessing included in the Roman Missal summarizes the spiritual symbolism of this sacramental:

O God, source and origin of all light, who on this day showed to the just man Simeon the light for revelation to the Gentiles, we humbly ask that, in answer to Your people's prayers, You may be pleased to sanctify with Your blessing these candles, which we are eager to carry in praise of Your Name, so that, treading the path of virtue, we may reach that light which never fails. Through Christ our Lord. – p. 667

It is appropriate to leave the blessed candle in a prominent place in your home or on in a prayer space. This enlighten your soul, bringing it out of darkness. is a reminder that Jesus, Who is the Light of the World, invites you to spend time with Him in prayer. Then when you take the time for personal or communal prayer in your home, you can light the candle to help you stay focused on praying.

Candles provide a powerful spiritual character to an environment, which even the secular world recognizes. They can encourage a calmness of the heart and open us up to experience the light of God.

Another way to use blessed candles is to bring them out during severe weather. Traditionally Catholics would always light the blessed candle during a strong storm, invoking the power of God to protect their home. And as is so often the case, Catholic spiritual traditions have a practical element: the candle will be useful if the power goes out.

Last of all, if you are not able to use the blessed candles because they are no longer usable, it is best to dispose of it properly. Catholics are instructed to dispose of old sacramentals in a way that shows reverence to them. All sacramentals can be either burned or buried in order to properly dispose of them. This type of disposal honors their sacred purpose and returns them to the earth in a dignified way. If a person is unable to do either, the sacramental may be dropped off at the parish office and someone on staff can take care of it.

Although this custom is not practiced everywhere, blessed candles can be saved and in some places where they are gathered together and melted down to create the Easter candle. You will need to contact your local parish or monastery to see if they do it.

If you are looking for something to enhance your spiritual life, you might consider using blessed candles to



The Christmas season ended too quickly and with January 12th and


'The Baptism of the Lord' we had to repeat our pre-Christmas drill.

Candlemas * Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary or Feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple

Observed 2nd February in the Latin Rite.

On this feast candles are blessed and carried in procession with appropriate prayers and ceremonies. The blessed beeswax candles typify the humanity which God the Son assumed, and signify that Jesus Christ is the True Light of the world by His Doctrine, grace, and example. They also represent the ardent faith, hope, and charity with which the Christian should follow Christ by humble obedience to His Gospel and imitation of His virtues. According to the Mosaic Law a mother

who had given birth to a man-child was considered unclean for seven days; moreover she was to remain three and thirty days "in the blood of her purification"; for a maid-child the time which excluded the mother from sanctuary was even doubled. When the time (forty or eighty days) was over the mother was to "bring to the Temple a lamb for a holocaust and a young pigeon or turtle dove for sin"; if she was not able to offer a lamb, she was to take two turtle doves or two pigeons; the priest prayed for her and so she was cleansed. (Leviticus 12:2-8)

Forty days after the birth of Christ Mary complied with this precept of the Law, she redeemed her first-born from the Temple (Numbers 18:15), and was purified by the prayer of Simeon the Just, in the presence of Anna the prophetess (Luke 2:22). No doubt this event, the first solemn introduction of Christ into the House of God, was in the earliest times celebrated in the Church of Jerusalem. We find it attested for the first half of the fourth century by the pilgrim of Bordeaux, Egeria or Silvia. The day (14th of February) was solemnly kept by a procession to the Constantinian Basilica of the Resurrection, a homily on Luke 2:22, and the Holy Sacrifice. But the feast then had no proper name; it was simply called "The Fortieth Day After Epiphany". This latter circumstance proves that in Jerusalem Epiphany was then the Feast of Christ's Birth.

From Jerusalem "The Feast of The Fortieth Day" spread over the entire Church and later on was kept on the 2nd of February, since within the last twenty-five years of the fourth century the Roman Feast of

Christ's Nativity (25th of December) was introduced.

In Antioch it was attested in AD 526; in the entire Eastern Empire it was introduced by the Emperor Justinian I (AD 542) in thanksgiving for the cessation of the great pestilence which had depopulated the city of Constantinople.

In the Greek Church it was called *Hypapante tou Kyriou*, the meeting of the Lord and His Mother with Simeon and Anna. The Armenians call it: "The Coming of the Son of God into the Temple" and still keep it on the 14th of February; the Copts

term it "Presentation of the Lord in the Temple". Perhaps the decree of Justinian gave occasion also to the Roman Church to introduce this feast, but definite information is wanting on this point.

The feast appears in the Gelasianum (manuscript tradition of the seventh century) under the new title of Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The procession is not mentioned. Pope Sergius I (AD 687 -701) introduced a procession for this day. The Gregorianum (tradition of the eighth century) does not speak of this procession, which fact proves that the procession of Sergius was the ordinary "station", not the liturgical act of today. The feast was certainly not introduced by Pope Gelasius to suppress the excesses of the Lupercalia (a pagan fertility procession), and it spread slowly in the West; it is not found in the "Lectionary" of Silos (AD 650) nor in the "Calendar" (AD 731-741) of Sainte-Geneviève of Paris. In the East it was celebrated as a Feast of the Lord; in the West as a Feast of Mary; The blessing of the candles did not enter into common use before the eleventh century.

Blessed candles are lighted at Mass and other church services; at the administration of all the Sacraments except Penance; in imparting the blessings, in processions, and in other liturgical ceremonies. There should be at least two blessed candles in every Catholic home for use when the Sacraments are administered to the sick, and at times of any special danger, blessing, or family devotion.



St. Blaise

Feast Day: February 3 Patron of Throat Illnesses

FEB. 8 & 9 THROAT BLESSING



Many Catholics might remember Saint Blaise's feast day because of the Blessing of the Throats that took place on this day. Two candles are blessed, held slightly open, and pressed against the throat as the blessing is said. Saint Blaise's protection of those with throat troubles apparently comes from a legend that a boy was brought to him who had a fishbone stuck in his throat. The boy was about to die when through the intercession of Saint Blaise he was healed.

Very few facts are known about Saint Blaise. We believe he was a bishop of

Sebastea in Armenia who was martyred under the reign of Licinius in the early fourth century.

The legend of his life that sprang up in the eighth century tells us that he was born into a rich and noble family who raised him as a Christian. After becoming a bishop, a new persecution of Christians began. He received a message from God to go into the hills to escape persecution. Men hunting in the mountains discovered a cave surrounded by wild animals who were sick. Among them Blaise walked unafraid, curing them of their illnesses. Recognizing Blaise as a bishop, they captured him to take him back for trial. On the way back, he talked a wolf into releasing a pig that belonged to a poor woman. When Blaise was sentenced to be starved to death, the woman, in gratitude, sneaked into the prison with food and candles. Finally Blaise was killed by the governor.

Blaise is the patron saint of wild animals because of his care for them and of those with throat maladies.

In His Footsteps: Take time as Saint Blaise did to find out how you can help wild animals. Find out what is being done to support and protect the wildlife in your area. There is wildlife everywhere, even in cities. Even a birdfeeder can help God's creatures survive.

Prayer: Saint Blaise, pray for us that we may not suffer from illnesses of the throat and pray that all who are suffering be healed by God's love. Amen





2025 FISH FRIES ARE IN OUESTION!

Due to increased costs, lacking sales, a shortage of workers, and equipment malfunctions, the K of C Lenten Fish Fries may not take place in 2025:

- The cost of fish, oil, fries, dinnerware, etc. have increased about 20% since last year.
- In order to make a reasonable profit (or break even), a minimum of 75 fish dinners must be sold at each event. In 2024, an average of 58 dinners were sold at each of four events.
- For various reasons, the number of Knights available to work these events has dwindled significantly. It takes a minimum of a dozen workers to prepare, serve, and cleanup at each fish fry event. (FYI: The Council has only had an average of 4 to 5 members in attendance at the last several business meetings!)

In 2024, one of the two fryers was out of order. As a result, both the fish and the French Fries had to be prepared, separately, using one fryer. This issue greatly slowed down the food preparation process. A final decision on the 2025 Lenten Fish Fries will be made at the regular Council business meeting on February 11th. We may have to consider increasing prices, changing the menu, or reducing the number of events to 2 or 3 dinners. However, a commitment from more members will be required in order to make Lenten Fish Fires happen this year.
