That my life is a gift ... Jesus, I trust in you.


That You will teach me to trust You ... Jesus, I trust in you.





Both Cain and Able offered sacrifices to God. God did not look with favor on Cain's but accepted Able's sacrifice because Able gave of his "first fruits" while Cain gave God his leftovers.

Next, set aside a **sacred space**, a place where you can enter into prayer. Have sacred images or photo's, have your Bible and maybe a votive candle. In other words, <u>tithe</u> a portion of your house to the Lord. Now that you have scheduled a time and set aside a sacred space; now just stick to it. Do it consistently in other words "Just do it".

Now to help you in prayer here are Devin's 7 R's

- 1. Recognize God's Presence in us and around us.
- **2. R**ead Scripture or a book on a saint; read until something strikes you then. . .
- **3.** Reflect- Spend some time on what is God saying to me in this reading.
- **4. R**espond Talk to God about what you read. Tell Him your dreams etc.
- **5. R**est We all need rest. Rest with those words and what you think God is saying to you.
- **6. R**esolution Based on what you got from your prayer time, resolve that today I will. . . be kinder, love my wife more, spend time with my children, don't stop and have a drink, call an old friend. Whatever it is, make a resolve to do it.
- 7. **R**emember that resolve throughout the day.

Our next meeting is September 11th from 9-11, It will be a day to reflect and share on the 20th Anniversary of 9/11. "Where were you when the world stopped turning that September day?" All men of the parish are welcome.

Why Do I Attend the Men of the Medal Prayer Group? By Eric Payne



St. Peter Claver

Feast Day: September 9 Patron Saint of Negro Missions 1580 - 1654


St. Peter Claver was born at Verdu, Catalonia, Spain in 1580 of impoverished parents descended from ancient and distinguished families. He studied at the Jesuit College of Barcelona, entered the Jesuit novitiate at Tarragona in 1602 and took his final vows on August 8th, 1604.

While studying philosophy at Majorca, the young religious was influenced by St. Alphonsus Rodriguez to go to the Indies and save "millions of perishing souls."

In 1610, he landed at Cartagena (modern Colombia), the principle slave market of the New World, where a thousand slaves were landed every month. After his ordination in 1616, he dedicated himself by special vow to the service of the Negro slaves - a work that was to last for thirty-three years. He labored unceasingly for the salvation of the

African slaves and the abolition of the Negro slave trade. The love he lavished on them was something that transcended the natural order.

Boarding the slave ships as they entered the harbor, he would hurry to the revolting inferno of the hold, and offer whatever poor refreshments he could afford; he would care for the sick and dying, and instruct the slaves through Negro catechists before administering the Sacraments.



of his converts when they left the ships, but followed them to the plantations to which they were sent, encouraged them to live as Christians, and prevailed on their masters to treat them humanely. He died in 1654.



September 29 - St. Michael, St. Gabriel, and St. Raphael, Archangels (MICHAELMAS)

Michaelmas, Christian Feast of St. Michael the Archangel is celebrated in the Western Churches on September 29. Given St. Michael's traditional position as leader of the heavenly armies, veneration of all angels was eventually incorporated into his feast day. In the Roman Catholic Church, Michaelmas is now more commonly celebrated as the Feast of Saints Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael, the archangels; in the Anglican Church, its proper name is the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels. The Eastern (Orthodox) Church does not observe Michaelmas and celebrates the archangels on November 8.

The veneration of St. Michael—typically regarded as the greatest of the archangels and a mighty defender of the Church against satan—began in the Eastern Church in the 4th century and had spread to Western Christianity by the 5th century. The feast date of May 8 commemorates the dedication of a sanctuary to St. Michael

at Monte Gargano in Italy in the 6th century. Michaelmas was originally celebrated as

Monte Gargano, Italy

a Holy Day of Obligation, but that requirement was gradually abolished.

During the Middle Ages, Michaelmas was a great religious feast and many popular traditions grew up around the day, which coincided with the harvest in much of western Europe. In England it was the custom to eat goose on Michaelmas, which was supposed to protect against financial need for the next year. In Ireland, finding a ring hidden in a Michaelmas pie meant that one would soon be married.

It is also interesting that in England there was the custom of "Quarter days" which often coincided with feast days: Quarter days, the days that begin each quarter of the year. In England they are March 25 (Lady Day), June 24 (Midsummer Day), September 29 (Michaelmas Day), and December 25 (Christmas Day). Some local variations of these dates are found. They are the days on which it is usually contracted that rents should be paid and houses or lands entered upon or quitted. In Scotland there are two legal terms, May 15 (Whitsunday) and November 11 (Martinmas), and these, with the two conventional terms, February 2 (Candlemas) and August 1 (Lammas- anAnglo-Saxon harvest festival), make up the Scottish quarter days. In the Scottish burghs, however, the removal terms are May 28 and November 28. In the United States the quarter days are, by law, the 1st of January, April, July, and October.

St. Michael's Lent

This week you will have the opportunity to begin a special, holy sacrifice, mortifying yourself in this unofficial-yet-formerlyknown cycle of penance and denial. This period lasts from August 15th through September 29th. This more-or-less 40-day fast (45 days, really) is basically Lent Part Two, only it takes place during the summertime. St. Michael's Lent used to be more of a well-known occasion during Christendom's glory days, but the best-known practitioner of this sacrifice was St. Francis of Assisi, who had a special devotion to Mother Mary and the Archangel Michael. He would annually embark on this lenten journey from The Feast of Mary's Assumption in late summer until the Feast of St. Michael, and in fact, it was during St. Michael's Lent that he received the miraculous stigmata. To this day, there are still some Franciscans who fast during this time. At first, the whole occasion—St. Michael's Lent and it's final day. Michaelmas—appears as a sort of mirror for Lent and Easter, the latter holiday being a time of relief and celebration at the end of a long trial of discipline. However, keep in mind that St. Michael's Lent isn't, exactly, as rigorous as the Lent that precedes Easter. Another thing that distinguishes this unofficial "Second Lent" from the official one is that Michaelmas used to be the traditional "Thanksgiving Dinner" of Christendom. And

overall, the seasonal timing is perfect, as St. Michael's Lent leads to a time of harvest and plenty. It almost seems natural to have fall carnivals, fairs, and feasts centered around such a day, seeing as how it lands at the end of a period of fasting and denial.

For Traditional Catholics in the 21st century who struggle to make an identity for themselves and try to differentiate themselves from the cultural bankruptcy that surrounds them, it would make sense to adopt, perhaps, a light version of this custom. It's a start, anyway. After all, did not Our Lady tell us that we need to practice penance and mortification in these dangerous hell-bound times? What better way to prepare ourselves for the upcoming angelic season than to prepare our bodies and intellects with sacrifice and prayer? Let us not be materialistic worldlings, whom our daily newsfeeds show to be losing their souls and their minds. Catholics should not have shallow thoughts and vacant lifestyles. We shouldn't be braindead, hedonistic zombies. It would behoove us to add even more depth to our love, holy pursuit, and understanding of the Divine.

Visiting the burial places of these children cuts through any rhetoric surrounding abortion and removes this conversation from the abstract into concrete reality.

HE SAINT BENEDICT MEDAI



Latin for: "May his presence protect us in the hour of death."

CHALICE WITH SERPENT:

This image represents the event when a group of monks plotted to murder St. Benedict because they believed his doctrines to be too strict. They poisoned the mass wine, but when St. Benedict bad the sign of the cross over the chalice, it fell to the ground and shattered.

EX S M CASINO MDCCCLXXX:

Latin for: "From the Holy Mount of Cassino, 1880."

RAVEN WITH BREAD IN REAK.

This image represents a second attempt to murder St. Benedict by poisoning his bread, but God sent a raven who carried it off before he could consume it.

HISTORY OF SAINT BENEDICT MEDAL:

The exact time and date of the making of the St. Benedict Medal is not known, but it was formally approved by Pope Benedict XIV in the year 1741. The most common medal today is the Jubilee medal that was struck in the year 1880 in remembrance of the 1400th anniversary of St. Benedict's birth. The letters on the back of the medal had been a mystery until an ancient manuscript was discovered at Metten Abbey in Bavaria in the year 1647, in which an exorcism formula was found that matched the medal's inscriptions. The St. Benedict Medal is one of the oldest and most honored medals used to ward off evil spirits.

FRONT OF MEDAL:

St. Benedict holding a cross in one hand and the book of his Rule in the other.

CRUXS PATRIS BENEDICTI.

Latin for: "The Cross of the Holy Father Benedict."

PAX: Latin for: "Peace."

BACK OF MEDAI

In the center on the back of the medal, there is a cross which St. Benedict greatly loved and used to drive away demons. On the vertical beam are the following letters: C.S.M.L. (Crux sacra sit mihi lux), which is Latin for, "May the holy

mihi lux), which is Latin for, "May the holy cross be for me a light." On the horizontal beam, there are five letters N.D.S.M.D. (Non draco sit mihi dux), which is Latin for, "Let not the dragon be my guide."

mihi dux), which is Latin for, not the dragon be my guide. RIGHT SIDE OF MEDAL:

ON D S W D S

Encircling the right side of

the back of the medal are the letters V.R.S.N.S.M.V

LEFT SIDE OF MEDAL:

"Be gone, Satan! Suggest not to me thy vain things."

(Vade retro Satana; nunquam suade mihi Encircling the left side of the back of the medal are the letters S.M.Q.L.I.V.B. (Sunt mala quae libas; ipse venena bibas), which is Latin for, "The drink you offer is evil; drink that poison yourself."

FOUR LARGE LETTERS AROUND CROSS:

C.S.P.B. (Crux sancti Patris Benedicti), which is Latin for, "The cross of the Holy Father Benedict."
