Divine Mercy pamphlets will be provided in the lobbies if you need one. The awesomeness of the Divine Mercy Novena is that on each day of the nine days we pray for a different intention that Jesus requested specifically. The blessings you may receive from praying this Novena are out of this world.

Ask a family member or friend to join you. Remember that where two or more are gathered in His Name, Jesus is there praying with you. Remember, you also can ask any who preceded you in this life to join you in prayer. The numbers praying with you can really add up in no time.

You may feel that it is a struggle to pray this entire 54-day Novena. Do not be discouraged, have hope. All our prayers are heard by God. If you miss a day or two, simply make it up the next day. Each Divine Mercy Chaplet usually takes less than 10 minutes. Singing our prayers is praying twice as Fr. Coleman tells us. Singing the Divine Mercy Chaplet takes only about 20 minutes! Please pray as much as you can.

May God bless all who join in praying this Novena, whether it be one day or 54 days. Thank You!!!

ABSTINENCE IN THE NEW TESTAMENT

In the first portion of his Gospel St. Matthew relates how Christ passed forty days in the desert, during which time neither food nor drink passed His lips. No doubt this penance of the God-Man was not only expiatory, but also exemplary.

True, Christ did not explicitly define the days nor the weeks wherein His followers would be obliged to fast and abstain. At the same time His example, coupled with His reply to the disciples of the Baptist, is evidence that the future would find His followers subjected to regulations whereby they would fast "after the bridegroom had been taken away". The only piece of clearly defined legislation concerning abstinence embodied in the New Testament was framed by the Council of Jerusalem, prescribing "abstinence from things sacrificed to idols, and from blood, and from things strangled" (Acts 15:29).

Nevertheless the Acts of the Apostles give evidence of a tendency on the part of the Church, as an organized body, to prepare the way for important events by abstinence and fasting (Acts 13:3; 14:22). In fine, St. Paul sets forth the necessity of abstinence when he says that "everyone striving for the mastery must abstain from all things" (1 Corinthians 9:25); and "let us exhibit ourselves as the ministers of Christ in labors, watchings, and fastings" (2 Corinthians 6:5), which he had often practiced (2 Corinthians 11:27).

UP FROM THE ASHES

"Rend your hearts." -Joel 2:13

Today, the Catholic Church marks our heads with an ashen cross. Ashes connote humility and death. Ashes are what is left over after something is burned. They are commonly associated with the residue of destruction and death (Est 4:3; Jb 2:8). We die to ourselves in the self-denial of Lent. The ashes of our desires are what remain after this death.

After a forest fire, the forest floor is covered with ashes. The ashes are the residue of death and destruction. However, the ashes also are the beginning of new life for the forest. The fire clears away the accumulated litter on the forest floor which had been smothering seedlings which struggled to grow every year. Now that the fire has burned away this litter, the ashes serve as a sort of mulch which protects and nourishes the new seedlings. Thus, the ashes enable the cycle of new life to begin.

We are like that. The Lenten ashes of our repentance (see Jb 42:6) and dying to self smother our selfish desires, enabling and nourishing new life to blossom within us.

What new life does the Lord want to spring up as a result of your dying to self this Lent? (see Is 61:3) Will it be a call to a new vocation, the conception of a new child, a new holiness, the courage to witness publicly for Jesus, or joining a small Christian community? Repent! Die to yourself (Lk 9:23). Let Jesus create His new, abundant life (Jn 10:10) in you.

Prayer: Father, may I crucify my flesh with its passions and desires (Gal 5:24). May I always be fertile and fruitful for You. **Promise:** "Keep your deeds of mercy secret, and your Father Who sees in secret will repay you." —Mt 6:4 **Praise:** John receives his ashes early on Ash Wednesday and

makes a silent witness for Christ by wearing them throughout the day at his downtown job.

St. John of God

Born: March 8, 1495

Died: March 8, 1550 – Granada, Spain Patron Saint of the Dying and All Hospitals

John of God was born João Duarte Cidade (Portuguese form, the Spanish form is João Cidade Duarte) in Montemor-o-Novo (now in the District of Évora in south-central Portugal), the son of André Cidade and

Teresa Duarte, a once-prominent family that was impoverished but had great religious faith. One day, when John was eight years of age, he disappeared. The circumstances of his disappearance are not clear and there are conflicting accounts. According to his original biography, his mother died from grief soon after this and his father joined the Franciscan Order.

The young João soon found himself a homeless orphan in the streets of Oropesa, near Toledo, Spain. There, in a foreign land, he had no one to care for him, nothing on which to live and he had to be content with whatever food he could find. He was eventually taken in by a man called Francisco Mayoral and the boy settled down as a shepherd caring for his sheep in the countryside.

The farmer was so pleased with João's strength and diligence that he wanted him to marry his daughter and to become his heir. At (about) the age 22 years, to escape his master's well-meant but persistent offer he joined a company of foot-soldiers, and in that company fought for Charles V, Holy Roman Emperor. While serving for the Count of Oropesa, he was appointed to guard an enormous amount of loot, much of which had been rifled by the time he was relieved. Suspicion naturally fell on him; even if he had not been involved in the theft, at the least he was guilty of dereliction of duty. He was condemned to death, but a more tolerant officer intervened to win his pardon.

Disillusioned by this turn of events, João returned to the farm in Oropesa, spending four years again in a pastoral life. This went on until the day that the Count and his troops marched by, on their way to fight in Hungary against the Turks. Still unmarried, he immediately decided to enlist with them, and left Oropesa for a final time. For the next 18 years he served as a trooper in various parts of Europe.

Succeeding years found him first at his birthplace, saddened by the news of his mother's premature death, which had followed close upon his mysterious disappearance; then a shepherd at Seville and still later at Gibraltar, on the way to Africa, to ransom with his liberty Christians held captive by the Moors. He accompanied to Africa a Portuguese family just expelled from the country, to whom charity impelled him to offer his services.

On the advice of his confessor João soon returned to Gibraltar, where, brief as had been the time since the invention of the printing-press, he inaugurated the apostolate of the printed page, by making the circuit of the towns and villages about Gibraltar, selling religious books and pictures, with practically no margin of profit, in order to place them within the reach of all.

It was during this period of his life that João is said to have had a vision of the Infant Jesus, who bestowed on him the name by which he was later known, **John of God**, also directing him to go to Granada (Spain). João then settled in that city, where he worked disseminating books, using the moveable type printing press of Johannes Gutenberg to provide people with works of chivalry and devotional literature.

João experienced a major religious conversion on Saint Sebastian's Day (January 20) of 1537, while listening to a sermon by John of Ávila who was later to become his spiritual director and who would encourage him in his quest to improve the life of the poor. At the age of 42, João had what was perceived at the



time as an acute mental breakdown. Moved by the sermon (of John of Ávila), he soon engaged in a public beating of himself, begging mercy and wildly repenting for his past life. He was incarcerated in the area of the Royal Hospital reserved for the mentally ill and received the treatment of the day, which was to be segregated, chained, flogged, and starved. John of Avila visited him and advised him to be more actively involved in tending to the needs of others rather than in enduring personal hardships. João gained peace of heart, and shortly after left the hospital to begin work among the poor.

About this time, he made a pilgrimage to the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Extremadura, where it is said he experienced a vision of Mary, who encouraged him to work with the poor. João expended all his energy in caring for the neediest people of the city. He established a house where he wisely tended to the needs of the sick poor, at first doing his own begging. When João began to put into effect his dream, because of the stigma attached to mental illness, he found himself misunderstood and rejected. For some time he was alone in his charitable work, soliciting by night the needed medical supplies, and by day attending to the needs of his patients and the hospital; but he soon received the cooperation of charitable priests and physicians. Many stories are related of the heavenly guests who visited him during the early days of his immense tasks, which were lightened at times by the Archangel Raphael in person. To put a stop to his custom of exchanging his cloak with any beggar he chanced to meet, Sebastian Ramirez, Bishop of Tui, had a religious habit made for him, which was later adopted in all its essentials as the religious garb of his followers, and the bishop imposed on him for all time the name given him by the Infant Jesus, John of God.

Slowly João drew to himself a dedicated circle of disciples who felt called to join him in this service. In 1535 he founded his first hospital at Granada, where he served the sick and afflicted. After ten years spent in the exercise of charity, he died March 8, 1550, of pneumonia after he had plunged into a river to save a young man from drowning. He was canonized by Pope Alexander VIII in 1690 and was declared *the patron saint of the dying and of all hospitals* by Pope Leo XIII in 1898.

The Order of Hospitallers were approved by the Holy See in 1572 as the <u>Brothers Hospitallers of Saint John of God</u>, who care for the sick in countries around the world. One mark of honor to his labors is that this Order has been officially entrusted with the medical care of the pope. In Italian they are also known commonly as the Fatebenefratelli, meaning "Do-Good Brothers", and elsewhere as the "Brothers of Mercy", the "Merciful Brothers" and the "John of God Brothers". The Order carries out a wide range of health and social service activities in 389 centers and services in 46 countries.

John of God's first companion, Anton Martín, O.H., was chosen to succeed him as prior general of the Order. Thanks to the generosity of King Philip II of Spain, a hospital was founded at Madrid, another at Córdoba and several others in various Spanish towns. Pope Pius V approved the Order of the Brothers Hospitallers in 1572 under the Rule of St. Augustine. The Order spread rapidly into the other countries of Europe, and even into the distant colonies. In 1584, Pope Gregory XIII called some of the Brothers to Rome and gave them the Hospital of St. John Calybita, Fatebenefratelli Hospital, located on an island in the Tiber, which then became the motherhouse of the whole Order. Brother Sebastiano Arias founded the Hospital of Our Lady at Naples and the famous Hospital of Milan. Another Brother Hospitaller at this time was John Grande, O.H., who was beatified by Pope Pius IX in 1852. Sources:Catholic Encyclopedia & Wikipedia
