


Folks, none of that mumbo jumbo makes a lick of sense. Here is what children need:


- 1. Children need a mother and a father who love each other and work together as a team.

St. Anthony Zaccaria

Born: 1502, Cremona, Italy

Died: July 5, 1539 Feast Day: July 5


Founder of the Clerks Regular of St. Paul, commonly known as the Barnabites.

While Anthony was still an infant his father died, leaving the care of the child's education to his mother, who taught him compassion for the poor and suffering by making him her almoner (an official distributor of alms). After completing the studies given in the schools at Cremona he was sent to Padua for his philosophy, and in 1520, when he had finished this course,

began the study of medicine in the university at that place. At the age of twenty-two he received his degree of Doctor of Medicine and returned to Cremona to practice his profession. Three years later he began to study theology and received Holy Orders in 1528. He now devoted himself with renewed energy to works of charity and mercy, visiting and consoling the sick in hospitals and poor-prisons.

The ministry of preaching and the administration of the sacraments produced such great fruit that St. Antonio was encouraged to seek a larger field for his labors and to carry out a great project which he had formed for the good of souls. He went to the populous city of Milan, of which he was a burgess (he had the full rights of citizenship), and entered the Confraternity of Eternal Wisdom. Among the members of this religious body he allied himself with two priests, Fathers Ferrari and Morigia, and told them of his idea of founding a congregation of secular clergy.

Northern Italy at this period was in a deplorable condition.
Frequent wars had devastated the country. The advent of the Lutheran soldiery and their contempt for everything Catholic had spread the contagion of bad example, while famine and plague followed in the track of the soldiers. These scourges combined to produce a state of misery that appealed most powerfully to



Antonio and his associates. "The Congregation of the Regular Clerks of St. Paul", St. Antonio's work, which began with five members, was canonically sanctioned by Pope Clement VII in 1533. Their rule bound them to "regenerate and revive the love of the Divine worship, and a truly Christian way of life by frequent preaching and the faithful administration of the sacraments."

The first superior of the new congregation was St. Antonio, who soon became known in Milan as an apostle. Besides giving conferences in churches to ecclesiastics and lay people, he went into the streets of the city with crucifix in hand, and produced great fruit in souls by preaching on the Passion and Death of Christ and the need of penance for sin.

In 1536 he resigned the superiorship to Father Morigia and later went to Vicenza at the request of Cardinal Ridolfi. There he succeeded in reforming morals and in bringing two religious communities of women to a stricter observance of their rule. In the latter labor he was greatly aided by a congregation of nuns "The Angelicals of St. Paul", which he had founded in Milan. He introduced, also, the devotion of the "Forty Hours' Prayers", in Vicenza. The last two years of his life were spent in Milan. He sought there a more suitable church for his Congregation and accepted the offer of the Church of St. Barnabas, but died before the affair was arranged. From this Church of St. Barnabas, the Congregation received the name by which its members are commonly known, i.e. Barnabites.

Worn out by his voluntary penances, as well as by his untiring labors of charity, he was attacked by fever during one of his missions. Knowing that this illness was his last, he had himself brought to his native city, Cremona. There, in his mother's house, he received the Last Sacraments and peacefully expired at the early age of thirty-seven. His body was found incorrupt 27 years after his death. He was declared Blessed by Pope Pius IX in 1849. On 15 May, 1897, he was solemnly canonized in St. Peter's, Rome, by Pope Leo XIII.

Do you know anyone who is interested in learning about the Catholic Faith?


Are you a life-long Catholic who would like to grow spiritually?

Did You Ever Wonder?

In the Apostles Creed we pray: "He descended into Hell."

Q. Why would Jesus descend into the place of eternal punishment?

A. He didn't.

According to Fr. John J. Dietzen, "The use of [hell] in our English translation of the Creed is unfortunate... The word is a translation from a Latin (also Greek and Hebrew) word which means the "lower regions" – a generic name for the place where people would go after death, without regard to a condition of reward or punishment." (John J. Dietzen; *The New Question Box*, p. 483; © 1983)

"SHEOL (ABODE OF THE DEAD), a Hebrew word that occurs more than 60 times in the Old Testament to signify the nether world.... In the Bible it designates [where one goes] whether one be just or wicked, rich or poor." (*New Catholic Encyclopedia*, Vol. 13, p. 170; © 1967)

"Sheol" is the Hebrew word Fr. Dietzen cited. The "lower regions" and the "nether world" are two terms for the same place. The significance of this is that those who died before Jesus died and rose had no access to either Heaven or Hell. At some point between His death and resurrection, Jesus "descended into [Sheol]" allowing those souls to finally enter into their permanent state – either eternal salvation or eternal damnation.

National Eucharistic Revival: Here's what you need to know

The National Eucharistic Revival, launching June 19 on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, or Corpus Christi, has a mission to "renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist," as stated on the initiative's website. Sponsored by the U.S. bishops, the revival aims to inspire people to encounter Jesus in the Eucharist. Here is all you need to know about the National Eucharistic Revival:

What is the Eucharistic Revival?

The Eucharistic Revival is a three-year initiative that aims to inspire, educate, and unite. In a world where not many people know Jesus intimately, the revival is meant to show everyone what wonders the True Presence of Jesus can do to heal the soul. Through a carefully planned timeline of events, after three years, the U.S. bishops hope to change the lives of many Catholics and non-Catholics alike. As the campaign organizers say on the revival's website, those who have been "healed, converted, formed, and unified" by the Eucharist have a mission to teach others "for the life of the world." This is what the National Eucharistic Revival envisions for the future of this movement.

Why are the U.S. bishops doing this?

Great question. The current world is hurting and straying far from God. According to Pew Research Center, only 31% of Catholics even believe in the True Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. It is up to that 31% to spread the truth to all. As the revival website says, "We all need healing, yet many of us are separated from the very source of our strength. Jesus Christ invites us to return to the source and summit of our faith — his Real Presence in the Holy Eucharist."

It is a time to confront the hardships that face people in everyday life. The National Eucharistic Revival is a powerful, uplifting way to rise to this challenge.

What's planned for the kickoff?

This coming year is the Year of Diocesan Renewal. From now through June of 2023, each diocese will offer events to promote and inspire understanding of the Eucharist. The training of "Eucharistic missionaries" will come through online and in-person resources that teach

about Christ and the Real Presence.

Everything will start with widespread Eucharistic Adoration and procession on the Solemnity of Corpus Christi.

What happens next?

Spanning until July 2024 and beyond, the movement will also include a Year of Parish Revival, a National Eucharistic Congress in 2024, and the National Year of Mission. Each year will be dedicated to serving a specific purpose in the National Eucharistic Revival's mission.

When is the **National Eucharistic Congress**?

This major national event will be held in Indianapolis, Indiana, from July 17-21, 2024

Over 100,000 Catholics are expected to "worship our Risen Lord in his humble disguise" and allow the Holy Spirit to "enkindle a missionary fire in the heart of our nation," according to the revival website. This "National Pilgrimage" will have both in-person and remote options, so everyone can take part in this solemn celebration.

How can I get involved?

There are many ways for individuals all over the United States to get involved in the National Eucharistic Revival. Catholics are given the option to become prayer partners, share testimonies, and call on the Holy Spirit to encourage and strengthen this movement. The revival calls upon "laypeople, families, religious orders, and priests to volunteer their time, talents, and prayers in pursuit of the grassroots renewal our world so desperately needs," its website says.

Available learning resources include Corpus Christi novenas in both English and Spanish, a document prepared by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) about the Eucharist, a question and answer page about the Eucharist, and a free course by Bishop Andrew H. Cozzens of the Archdiocese of Crookston on learning to embrace the gift of the Eucharist. More resources will become available throughout the movement's timeline.

Where can I go for more information?

The best spot for more information is the National Eucharistic Revival <u>website</u> itself. Not only does it have an abundance of learning resources and prayer assistance, but also a list of answered <u>frequently asked questions</u>. The USCCB website also has a wealth of resources.
