August - The Month of the Immaculate Heart of Mary

The Immaculate Heart of Mary is a special form of devotion to the physical heart of Mary. It is Mary's love for God, her love for her Son and her love for all people that draws us to want to study and to imitate her.

In his Gospel, Luke mentioned the devotion twice, saying that Mary kept what Jesus was saying and doing in her heart.

Historically, during the 12th century, writers such as St. Anselm and St. Bernard of Clairvaux had great influence in Marian devotion. It was St. Eudes (1601-1680) who renewed the devotion, made it public a published Coeur Admirable (Admirable Heart) to promote devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

In 1917, at Fatima, Portugal, Mary appeared to three children

while in the hills tending sheep. ON July 13, during one of her six apparitions, Mary told the children, "to save poor sinners God wishes to establish in the world devotion to my Immaculate Heart." Twenty-five years later, December 8, 1942, on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Pope Pius XII dedicated the Church and the human race to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and extended the feast to the entire Church.

Mary's Immaculate Heart is typically pictured with flames representing her burning or undying love. Her Heart is encircled by roses or lilies symbolizing her joys and her purity and oftentimes, a sword pierces the heart reflecting the prophecy of Simeon in the Gospel of Luke. Mary's Heart is a symbol of her compassion and her sinlessness.

Our Lady of Fatima - Queen of the World

In a "CRUSADE" article, July/August 2022, *page 11*, I learned many new things about Our Lady of Fatima and her Pilgrim Statue.

- In 1946, Sr. Lucia was given permission to consult with Jose Thedim, a Portuguese sculptor, to create a new statue of Our Lady of Fatima. Sr. Lucia sent him detailed instructions. Pope Pius XII crowned the completed statue as "Queen of the World."
- In 1947 Sr. Lucia requested, by letter, that this statue would become a Pilgrim Statue, and travel throughout the world. On October 13, 1947 the Bishop of Leiria solemnly blessed the completed statue and her travels soon commenced.
- Five years later, Pope Pius XII remarked: "In 1946, I crowned Our Lady of Fatima as Queen of the World and the following year, through the Pilgrim Virgin, She set forth as though to claim her dominion, and the favors She performs along the way are such that we can hardly believe what we are seeing with our eyes."
- In 1972 on the evening July 17, after a tour of churches in the New Orleans area, Fr. Joseph Breault, M.A.P., who was the custodian of the statue, found that the statue was weeping (shortly after 9:00pm). Msgr. Romagosa who was editor of the *Clarion Herald* archdiocesan newspaper was called to come and take photos, but within a short time the tears ceased and the statue was totally dry. Fr. Breault said that this was the 13th time he had seen this phenomenon. Msgr. Romagosa went home.

You may have seen this picture and never knew where it originated - until today:

• Fr. Breault called Msgr. Elmo Romagosa again the next morning: At 7:00am the phone rang again stating that the statue was still weeping. Once more I gathered my camera and lights and upon arrival at 7:30am, I saw an abundance of fluid in the statue's eyes and a large drop of liquid at the tip of the statue's nose. A sample was taken and confirmed to be human tears.

Did St. Dominic really receive the Rosary from Mary?

You might have read in some articles about the history of the Rosary stating that Mary's giving the Rosary to St. Dominic is a myth: the Rosary evolved over many centuries from ancient practices, etc. etc. That is false!

The apparition occurred in southern France, in an out of the way spot known as Prouilhe in the Languedoc region.

In the year 1208, St. Dominic was not successful in converting the Albegensians (they denied the Divinity of Christ) back to the true faith, Our Lady gave him a powerful weapon, the Angelic Salutation (i.e. the Angel Gabriel's greeting to the Virgin Mary at the Incarnation), AND the pattern in which it should be prayed. The Blessed Virgin said to him: "Wonder not that you have obtained so little fruit by your labors, you have spent them on barren soil, not yet watered with the dew of Divine grace. When God willed to renew the face of the Earth, He began by sending down on it the fertilizing rain of the Angelic Salutation. Therefore preach my Psalter composed of 150 Angelic Salutations and 15 Our Fathers, and you will obtain an abundant harvest."

St. Dominic established his headquarters at Prouilhe with his first community of cloistered nuns, and where Our Lady, in the year 1208, first gave him the devotion of the holy Rosary as his spiritual weapon to labor with her in the fight for souls. All of this was destroyed during the French Revolution.

This is a photo of the image of Our Lady of Las Lajas in the Guaitara Canyon, Columbia - South America!

The image appeared miraculously in the stone of the mountain in 1754! The image is imbedded in the stone and tests prove that the coloration goes several inches into the solid rock.

Please note, that Mary is seen giving the Rosary to St. Dominic! And Baby Jesus is giving the Cord to St. Francis.

for the souls of your priests in Purgatory.



Prayer

From the introduction to the 1915 Benziger Brothers edition of the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin Mary......

Prayer is the great duty of man here below: *Oportet semper or are et non deficere* — "We ought always to pray and not to faint" (Luke xviii. i).

We appear before God under three different aspects: as individuals, as members of congregations or societies, and as members of a Divine Society. Hence there are three kinds of prayer: (1) private prayer, (2) prayer in common, and (3) the prayer of the Church, or liturgical prayer.

Of the first kind, private prayer, Our Lord spoke when He said: "But thou when thou shalt pray, enter into thy chamber, and having shut the door, pray to thy Father in secret, and thy Father who seeth in secret will repay thee," (Matt. vi. 6).



The second kind, **prayer in common**, is that which we offer as members of congregations or societies. The prayers said by the members of a family, such as morning and night prayers, the prayers said together by the members of a congregation or a community, are better than individual prayers. Our Lord praised this kind of prayer when He said: "If two of you shall consent upon Earth, concerning anything whatsoever they shall ask, it shall be done to them by My Father who is in Heaven. For where there are two or three gathered together in My Name, there am I in the midst of them," (*Matt, xviii. 19, 20*).

The third kind, **liturgical prayer**, is much more pleasing to

God; it excels both private prayer and prayer in common. It is the prayer we offer as members of a Divine Society, the Holy Church.



The public prayer of the Church may be looked upon as the public act of the whole body of the Church. Those who by their Rule, approved by the Church, are charged with saying the Office, whether it be the Divine Office or the Little Office of the Blessed Virgin, say it as public officers of the Church, who officially stand before the throne of God and make intercession for the whole body of Christ's Church.

When performing this duty, even when alone, they cease to pray as private individuals; they are invested with the public character of ambassadors to the Heavenly Court. But an ambassador's personal merit is of very secondary concern. What does matter is the dignity and power of him who sent the ambassador, and whom he represents. Those who take part in this public Office do not stand before God in their own name, nor yet in the name of the faithful assembled, but in the name of the Holy Church appointed by God. Her service and prayer do not partake of the worth and devotion of the angels, but of the worth of the Mystical Body of Christ.

Holy Days of Obligation and The Feast of The Assumption

In the Old Testament, from the time of the Exodus when God specifically gave Moses the instructions for the Tabernacle, He also included instructions for the times of worship: daily sacrifices, the Sabbath (weekly day of rest) and six feasts which imbedded the events of their journey and God's providence in their collective memory: The Passover and the Feast of Unleavened Bread (Lev 23:4-8); The Offering of the First Fruits (Lev. 23:9-14); The Feast of Weeks (Lev. 23:15-22); The Feast of Trumpets (Lev. 23:23-25); The Day of Atonement (23:26-32); and the Feast of Booths (Lev. 23:33-44).

Jesus was Jewish! The Catholic Church, in Scripture and Tradition, takes Jesus salvific works which He, Himself, overlaid throughout the Jewish Traditions and thus (through Tradition and Scripture) in the Catholic Church: the priest says Mass daily (this mirrors the daily sacrifice of lambs in the Tabernacle and in the Temple); the Church requires that we attend Mass on Sunday (this mirrors the Sabbath day of rest); and, to mark the special events which are essential to belief and practice of our Catholic Faith, the Church sets apart special days for reverence and worship. Hence we have six Holy Days of Obligation apart from the Sunday Mass obligation. These are:

- ★ The Solemnity of Mary January 1st
- ▼ The Ascension Thursday 40 days after Easter
- ► The Assumption August 15th
- ▲ All Saints Day November 1st
- ▼ The Immaculate Conception December 8th

★ The Nativity of the Lord - December 25th

The **Feast of the Assumption** celebrates the day on which Jesus returned to Earth to reunite His Blessed Mother's soul and body ".....You will not let your Holy One see corruption" (Acts 13:35). The Blessed Trinity, along with myriads of angels, brought Mary, body and soul, into Heaven. There she can assume all the dignity that God has bestowed upon her and further carry out her mission as our mother! In Revelation 12:1-3 we read "And a great sign appeared in Heaven, a woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve

stars; she was with child and she cried out in her pangs of birth, in anguish for delivery."

Mary's Assumption is evidence of Jesus' promise that we, who believe in Him, will also be reunited with our bodies at the resurrection.

This year, the Feast of the Assumption, August 15, 2022, falls on a Monday. The bishops of the United States have abrogated (i.e. to abolish by authoritative action) the duty of attending Mass on this Holy Day.



While it is not our duty, could we not make it our pleasure to come to Mass (9:00am) and share the joy of Heaven in honoring our mother, who listens to our every prayer?

Rob de Santos in Portugal!

Rob sent me an email in April advising of his move to Portugal. I had no idea!! He also sent some pictures of the beautiful little town where he is living. I hope you enjoy his update. Elaine Sturm, Editor

Friends, Brothers and Sisters,

I've been in Portugal for nearly five weeks and things are going well. I wanted to share my experience today at Mass in Portugal.

After a two-year hiatus due to the pandemic, English language Mass resumed in Tavira. Mass was at Igreja de Santiago de Tavira (Church of St James in Tavira). The church is small but keeping in mind that there are over 20 Catholic churches in Tavira (a town of less than 30,000 today and much less centuries past) and many churches were built hundreds of years ago. This church was built in about 1270 on the



site of a mosque, following the Reconquista of al Andalus in 1242, and is named in honor of the Knights of St. James who helped liberate this part of Andalus. It was extensively damaged in the Great Earthquake and tsunami in 1755 (magnitude 8.5+) and was rebuilt. It still reflects that rebuild today.

The English language Mass was wedged between regular Masses in Portuguese at 9 and 11 and it was obvious that they were still getting it together as Mass didn't begin until about 10:10 AM. It appears this will be the regular time every week save for Easter Sunday, when Masses will only be in Portuguese, as there won't be sufficient time to fit it in. I was a few minutes early to be sure I found the right place. Once the 9:00 Mass concluded, I went in and took a seat. I sat about 10 rows back on the left side but as it turned out only about 20 people showed up and no one sat in front of me. [Twenty is pretty good considering there are only a few hundred permanent UK/US residents here.] I imagine the church could hold about 300 full up.

Prior to the Mass a young man, probably 25 or so, came around and asked if I could speak and read English and would I do the Second Reading? This turned out to be Ricardo, who would serve as the cantor/organist, and could possibly be a seminarian. I wasn't prepared to lector but said yes anyway. Thankfully, I've lectored for many years and had my reading glasses with me.

The priest, who never gave his name as far as I could tell, was older than I am, so perhaps 70. He struggled mightily in English and apologized for that several times. Apparently, he had not spoken English at all in over two years. I would say that his English is worse than my rusty Spanish, but he gets great appreciation for doing this Mass despite the language challenges. When he finally started the Mass moved along very quickly, lasting less than 40 minutes. My guess is that the Missal in use is

probably from the UK as there were slight differences in language from what you might be used to in the US. Of course, the Mass is universal, so it was easy to follow. The readings were as you would expect for the fifth Sunday in Lent though again from what was likely a UK text. I didn't have much trouble doing the reading though the print size in the book at the ambo was small and forced me to follow it very closely. I could have used a couple more levels of magnification in the reading glasses. [Note to self: bring reading aid next time.]

When it came time for the homily, the priest motioned for Ricardo to come up and he read the homily in English. Ricardo does appear fluent in English. On the walk home, I stopped at the French bakery (La Baguette -Artisan Boulanger Français) to pick up some tarts. It's the only French bakery in the area and the proprietors speak four

languages (Portuguese/ English/ French/ Spanish). I don't get there often as I am not an early riser, and while the hours are nominally until "soneca



de tarde" a/k/a "siesta" at 1 or 2 PM, they close as soon as they have sold out for the day. This was only the third time I've made it in almost five weeks. It was worth the stop.

If anyone has questions, feel free to email back and ask. I tried to send this to as many who might be interested as possible but if I left someone out it wasn't intentional. I'll post more pictures on Facebook later to go with the ones I did around the town.
