

MORE ON STRIKING THE BREAST

Last issue we looked at the history of "striking the breast" as a liturgical act, a part of prayer. We saw that there are times within the Mass that we naturally are drawn to bow our heads and place our right fist over our hearts-three times, as at the Confiteor (through my fault, through my fault, through my fault, through my fault).

Are there other prayers where it seems natural to strike our breast as a physical sense of begging God for forgiveness? 1. When praying any litany during the three intercessions: i.e. Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world, Spare us O Lord; Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world, graciously hear us O Lord; Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world, have mercy on us. 2. When saying the short intercession to the Sacred Heart: i.e. Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us; Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us; Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us. 3. When praying to the Blessed Mother as follows: O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee.

The blow also is to wake us up. It is to shake the soul awake into the consciousness that God is calling, so that she may hear, and take his part and punish herself. She reflects, repents and is contrite. It is for this reason that priest and people strike their breasts when they confess their sins at the foot of the altar.*

Before Communion also we strike our breasts when the priest holds up for us to see the Body of the Lord, and we say, "Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldst enter under my roof, and again, in the litany when we confess our guilt and say, "We sinners beseech thee to hear us." *

But in these customs the force of the meaning of the rite has been weakened, as it has been also when the Host or Chalice is lifted up, or in the Angelus at the words, "The Word was made flesh and dwelt among us." The gesture in these instances has come to mean no more than reverence or humility. Its astringency should be restored. It is a summons to repentance and to the self-inflicted punishment of a contrite heart.*

(meaning one full meal a day and two lesser meals).

On all Fridays during Lent everyone fourteen (14) and older must ABSTAIN from meat.

ABSTINENCE IN THE NEW TESTAMENT

In the first portion of his Gospel St. Matthew relates how Christ passed forty days in the desert, during which time neither food nor drink passed His lips. No doubt this penance of the God-Man was not only expiatory, but also exemplary.

True, Christ did not explicitly define the days nor the weeks wherein His followers would be obliged to fast and abstain. At the same time His example, coupled with His reply to the disciples of the Baptist, is evidence that the future would find His followers subjected to regulations whereby they would fast "after the bridegroom had been taken away". The only piece of clearly defined legislation concerning abstinence embodied in the New Testament was framed by the Council of Jerusalem, prescribing "abstinence from things sacrificed to idols, and from blood, and from things strangled" (Acts 15:29).

Nevertheless the Acts of the Apostles give evidence of a tendency on the part of the Church, as an organized body, to prepare the way for important events by abstinence and fasting (Acts 13:3; 14:22). In fine, St. Paul sets forth the necessity of abstinence when he says that "everyone striving for the mastery must abstain from all things" (1 Corinthians 9:25); and "let us exhibit ourselves as the ministers of Christ in labors, watchings, and fastings" (2 Corinthians 6:5), which he had often practiced (2 Corinthians 11:27).

Ideas for Lenten Practices

The smallest of gifts have infinite value when offered to the Sacred Heart for others.

- Read a chapter from the Bible each day.
- Memorize a Psalm.
- Pray the Rosary each day.
- Give up one hour of video/audio/phone each day can be coffered for those with addictions. Try 30 minutes if you can't make it to an hour.
- Visit the sick. Or, if you can't, send a card.
- Say one prayer each day for the person you find hardest to deal with or for a family member who has anger issues.
- Consciously dedicate to Jesus' Sacred Heart one small act of kindness each day for members of your family.
- Go to the COOL March Friday Stations and the four (4) March Fish Fries even if you don't like fish!
- Try to be patient when you find yourself waiting in line offer your waiting for a particular intention.
- While driving whenever you are tempted to hit the horn say an 'Our Father' instead for the intention of the person in that car.
- Hug everyone of your family members every day and if you can't hug them send them a blessing.
- Call the one family member you have not talked to in over six months and tell them you love them.
- Attend one weekday Mass (in addition to Sunday) each week during Lent.
- Bring a "shut'in" to church.
- Give up eating out one time each week (fast food or other) and donate that money to the Rice Bowl or other charity.
- Give up one can of soda, cup of coffee or other beverage each day.
- Attend an hour of Eucharistic Adoration each week.

Don't do this practice for yourself, do it for God!

if you need one. The awesomeness of the Divine Mercy Novena is that each day of the 9 days there are specific prayers for Jesus' intentions. Intentions which He gave to St. Faustina for this Novena. The blessings you may receive from praying this Novena are out of this world.

Ask a family member or friend to join you. Remember that where two or more are gathered together in

agreement, Jesus is there praying with you. In my own prayers I ask those who have died in my family and those other deceased for whom I pray to join me in this prayer. You can have a whole army of souls praying with you! If you miss a day or two, simply make it up the next day.

Divine Mercy pamphlets will be available in the lobbies If a 54-day Novena seems unmanageable, please pray what you are able to do. Each Divine Mercy Chaplet takes about 10 minutes. Singing the Divine Mercy Chaplet takes about 20 minutes. Remember as Fr Coleman tells us, singing is like praying twice.

Help Wanted:

Sacristans for the 10:00AM Sunday Mass

We have been slowly trying to move back to our pre-Covid life in the church. One of the areas that we are still lacking is the Sacristan for the Sunday morning Mass.

We usually see Fritz Mirville coming early and setting up things in preparation for the Mass. However, when Fritz is not here we are at a loss - creating a lot of rushing around at the last minute to get everything in place.

What does the sacristan do? Here is the general outline for a typical Sunday Mass:

Before Mass - arrive at least 30 minutes prior to Mass. In the sacristy:

- 1) Turn on the PA system;
- 2) Set up trays for the Mass (to be placed on the credence table)
 a) chalice set up: place one large host on the paten
 - insure the chalice purificator, paten, pall and corporal are placed correctly on top of the chalice
 - b) place the cruet with the water on the tray along with

the small bowl and cloth for the washing of the hands c) place the tabernacle key on the tray

- d) place extra vessels (usually 2) for distribution of Holy Communion (this may require a second tray).
- 3) Take the tray/s to the credence table and place the tabernacle key in the tabernacle.
- 4) Fill the large gold bowl with a generous handful of hosts. Place the bowl and wine cruet on the table in the back aisle of the church for the gift bearers.

AFTER MASS:

Purify the vessels used in the Holy Mass. Thoroughly rinse the altar cloths which might have Precious Blood spilled on them and open them over the hamper to dry.

Put everything away in the sacristy. Lock the chalice in the cupboard.

While this may seem like a lot to do, once you have practiced a time or two it will become second nature.

Please consider giving of your time to support the Holy Mass. Contact Dcn. Steve to get started!
